Sterling Classical School provides a format that inspires each student on the educational tract through a classical academic rigor that comes vibrantly to life through the myriad of hands-on experiences, the engagement in extracurricular activities, and the pursuit of Christ-like character. The entire curricular format from Kindergarten through twelfth grade is designed to produce a well-rounded graduate with a love of learning who finds themselves fully prepared for the journey to either a collegiate destination or alternative God directed pursuit.

Admission Requirement

The admission process is designed not to be exclusive but to be inclusive of families who strongly desire a classical, Christian, college-preparatory education with an emphasis on character development. Selection is based on academic evaluation, personal family interview, admission questionnaires and the potential for a student to perform with excellence at Sterling.

School of Rhetoric Overview

The primary objective is teaching motivated students to articulate clearly and persuasively the knowledge they acquire in the various disciplines. The Sterling humanities sequence consists of the chronological study of western literature and history from Antiquity to modern European and American literature. Emphasis is placed on primary documents, research, close reading, critical writing, and historical analysis. In Literature, History, and Rhetoric classes, major theme writing assignments play a critical role in developing a student's ability to learn through individual research, drafting, and revision. This compliments the Socratic method infused across the classes where emphasis is placed on collaboration, problem solving, speaking skills and student ownership of their learning.

Senior Thesis

This is the final piece of the classical education tapestry and a graduation requirement for all Sterling students. The thesis is an opportunity for the graduate to demonstrate in summation the refined skills learned in the School of Rhetoric. Rhetoric is defined as the art of effective communication. The student will give an engaging, detailed oral presentation based on extensive research covering a student-identified controversial topic. The student will present with demonstrated ability of critical thinking skills, dynamic presentation style and defense of their topic during questioning from the senior panel. Through the senior thesis students learn to persuasively express value judgments and through the senior thesis they learn and apply project management, academic research, analysis, and public skills.

Service Portfolio

Sterling graduates will be required to present a service portfolio that will document a total of 80 service hours accumulated over the 9th-12th grade years. This portfolio will include specific records of hours as they are achieved, pictures and personal testimony.

Ranking/GPA

Sterling Classical School does not rank its students except for the top two students in order to designate Valedictorian and Salutatorian. Due to selective admission, class rank is insignificant in predicting college success. The grade point average is computed on an un-weighted 4-point scale. All core classes are classified as Honors secondary to the caliber of work within thestructure of the class.

Curriculum more closely resembles the IB than AP program. Sterling classes meet and exceed the AP requirements allowing students preparation for AP exams as they choose while still covering the more in-depth study required by Sterling's defined curriculum. The alignment with the IB program manifests itself in several elements including the Theory of Knowledge that develops a coherent approach to learning that unifies the academic disciplines focusing on critical thinking, student's inquiry into the nature of knowing and deepening their understanding of knowledge.
